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I've heard toy boxes aren't a very good idea because (a) kids can get trapped inside them, (b) they can get their fingers mashed if the lid comes down suddenly, (c) everything gets completely mixed up in there so you can't find anything. Shelves or shallow drawers might be a better option. These days, toy boxes solve the problems of (a) and (b), because they usually have holes (for ventilation if the kid does get in and can't get out) and special hinges to prevent finger mashing. My dad made my son a toybox for his first birthday, and I just asked him to be sure to keep your two points in mind, for safety. He used safety hinges, and the lid doesn't close all the way (unless you're sitting on it), so that would provide ventilation if Nathan fell in and couldn't get out. So far, he's never fallen in, though he has gotten high-centered when trying to reach a toy. I agree that stuff gets mixed up in there, but that was kinda the point, in my case. I wanted something that would make it easier to clean up in his room. We just pick up everything, and throw it in the toy box
